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

THE MYSTERY OF THE BLESSED TRINITY

Today we celebrate the solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. The Church sets aside this Sunday to focus our attention on the mystery of the Blessed Trinity, God who is one, but three persons—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

The first reading from Deuteronomy emphasizes both God's awesome greatness and amazing nearness. It might seem beyond belief, but the God of all creation speaks to us, protects us, and guides us. The second reading from Saint Paul's Letter to the Romans describes how we are to relate to the three persons who are one God. We are led by the Spirit to meet God the Father as adopted children. Our adoption is such that we are even heirs with our brother, Christ, the second person of the Trinity, in whose sufferings we must also share. In Matthew's Gospel, Jesus speaks with his authority as God and sends us to teach and baptize in the name of the Trinity.

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TODAY'S READINGS

First Reading — The Lord is God in the heavens above and on earth below (Deuteronomy 4:32-34, 39-40).

Psalm — Blessed the people the Lord has chosen to be his own (Psalm 33).

Second Reading — You received a Spirit of adoption, through whom we cry, "Abba, Father!" (Romans 8:14-17)

Gospel — Baptize them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit (Matthew 28:16-20).

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity

Astonishing is the term that Clement of Alexandria used in referring to the Holy Trinity. Today's scriptures tell the astonishing stories, from Moses in the Old Testament to the end of Matthew's Gospel, of how we mere humans are intended to be intimately associated with our loving God. We see in Deuteronomy that Moses reminds the new generation of Israelites of the "astonishing" fact that, even though the ancient world teemed with gods, their God was the only God, that "there is no other." Saint Paul in the letter to the Romans writes about those who follow the Spirit as being "sons" of God, which of course would make us brothers and sisters of Christ, and, as he says, "joint heirs with Christ." Another astonishing statement! Finally, Christ bestows the Holy Spirit on the world as his continuing presence and force of divine revelation. How can we not be astonished?

THE MYSTERY IS THE MASTERPIECE

The Most Holy Trinity is the central truth and, indeed, mystery of our lives as believers in God. Even so, few seem to be able talk about it. (Or is it "them"?) Must we be satisfied to take this truth as an inscrutable object of faith that we can easily ignore? Not at all! We are immersed in Trinitarian reality in many ways.

Please consider these clues to God as more than just Person of the Father. Remember the words of God in scripture when the world and all its wonders were coming to be. The formulas for each stage in creation begin with "Let us . . ." (Genesis 1:26). This is not merely the "Royal We." This is God as a plurality of Being. In Isaiah, the seraphim cry out "Holy, holy, holy . . ." (Isaiah 6:3). Ancient Middle Eastern superlatives come in threes, but why not consider it a sign of God's three-ness? And these Old Testament foreshadowings are nothing compared to our well-known baptismal formula, "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Notice that "name" is singular, and yet refers to three persons. Finally, as Christ tells the Apostles in today's Gospel, they are to go out and teach in that same singular triple name.

SHALL WE DANCE?

The famous icon by the equally famous fourteenth-century iconographer Andrej Rublev is a depiction of the Trinity densely packed with symbolic content. The three "angels" sitting at a table are actually meant to be the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. They relate to each other in loving gesture, each one to the other, often described as "dance-like."

And yet this triangular circle seems incomplete. Indeed it is, because we must become one with this circle of life-giving love. As in a dance, we are drawn into the divine life in the Trinitarian embrace of abundant glory and harmony. Then we complete the movement by taking that love incarnated out to the world, revealing the mystery to our sisters and brothers through our own lives.

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A Message From Fr. Rafael

Dear St Anthony community,

“Peace be with you.” Today, the Feast of Pentecost brings us to conclude our Easter celebrations. How quickly our 50 days of Easter have gone. We have witnessed and lived the mystery of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ through Holy Scripture, Holy Tradition and the Magisterium of the Church. By dying on the Cross, Jesus Christ conquered death for us, so that we may have Eternal Salvation. God so loved the world that he sacrificed his only Son so that we might be redeemed from our sins and therefore be able to participate and abide in a life of Grace and his Spirit be what would help us to continue our journey to him, to carry our Cross, to do his will. The celebrations end today but as he has shown the way, we should carry on. Under the circumstances in which we celebrated Easter last year at the beginning of the pandemic, it reminded us how it would have been in the early days of the Church, when the disciples and those Christians who believed in Jesus Christ were hiding for fear of persecution. How unstable everything was for us too; we were told to shelter in place and avoid one another for fear of contracting the novel coronavirus COVID 19. We would see surges of the virus take its toll and then temporarily release us and then surge again and again. Even though, we have lost many of our brothers and sisters to this coronavirus and for whom we pray, but still, we who carry on, have persevered in our faith. We at St. Anthony continued to celebrate Mass, hear confessions, share the Word of God, feeding on the Eucharist, and all of these and more is what has kept us, as Church, united in Jesus Christ. I thank you for your faith, perseverance, testimony, and fidelity to God.

After Jesus’s death and resurrection, the disciples, maybe with doubts and fears and even reservations, went back to their old lives, some were still with minds set on his death. As Luke says “Why do you seek the living among the dead? He is not here but has risen.” So must we throw off our fears and set our hope and confidence in Jesus Christ. Our journey because of this pandemic is probably still uncertain ahead of us and we must remain vigilant and cautious but as people of the Resurrection, baptized children of God, we should move on, not with fear but with the confidence set in the Spirit of love, the Spirit of life and truth.

After rising from the dead, Jesus came to his disciples and doubters, he said to them “Peace be with you.” In those forty days, Jesus Christ ate with them, walked with them, and spoke with them. He even let them touch him. Then he ascended up into the clouds to sit at the right hand of God. But before his departure, he promised never to leave us, and today we celebrate that moment when the Holy Spirit came down upon them and for us. A Spirit of love that fills our hearts. The Holy Spirit that allows us to remain in him as he

EL MISTERIO DE LA SANTÍSIMA TRINIDAD

Hoy celebramos la solemnidad de la Santísima Trinidad. La Iglesia dedica este domingo a centrar nuestra atención en el misterio de la Santísima Trinidad, Dios, que es uno, en tres personas: Padre, Hijo y Espíritu Santo.

La primera lectura de Deuteronomio hace énfasis en la grandeza imponente de Dios y su cercanía asombrosa. Puede parecer increíble, pero el Dios de toda la creación nos habla, nos protege y nos guía. La segunda lectura, tomada de la carta de San Pablo a los Romanos, describe la forma en que se relacionan las tres personas que son un solo Dios. El Espíritu nos guía para cumplir con Dios Padre como hijos adoptivos. Nuestra adopción es tal que somos incluso los herederos de nuestro hermano, Cristo, la segunda persona de la Trinidad, cuyos sufrimientos también debemos compartir. Un Mensaje del Padre Rafael

Amada comunidad de San Antonio,

“La paz este con ustedes.” Hoy, Domingo de Pentecostés, se cierra nuestro Tiempo Pascual. Qué rápido han pasado nuestros 50 días de Pascua. Hemos presenciado y vivido el misterio de la Resurrección de Jesucristo a través de la Sagrada Escritura, la Sagrada Tradición y el Magisterio de la Iglesia. Por su muerte en la Cruz, Jesucristo nuestro Señor ha vencido a la muerte para que tengamos la eterna salvación. Dios amó tanto al mundo que sacrificó a su único Hijo para que pudiéramos ser redimidos de nuestros pecados, y así, poder ser partícipes de la vida en su gracia y seguir adelante en nuestra jornada de fe, cargando nuestra Cruz and cumpliendo su Santa voluntad. Las celebraciones de Pascua terminan hoy, pero como él nos enseño, la jornada debe continuar.

Las circunstancias en que celebramos la Pascua del año pasado al comienzo de la pandemia, nos recordó cómo habría sido en los primeros días de la Iglesia, cuando los discípulos y los cristianos que creían en Jesucristo se escondían por miedo a la persecución. Así que fue al comienzo de la pandemia, con lo inestable que era todo, que nos dijeron que nos refugiáramos en nuestros hogares y nos evitáramos unos a otros por temor a contraer el nuevo coronavirus COVID 19. Vimos brotes de este virus surgir fuertemente, luego temporalmente calmarse solo para nuevamente volver a surgir una y otra vez más. Hemos perdido a tantos de nuestros hermanos y hermanas a causa de este coronavirus, y oramos por ellos y sus familias, pero nosotros debemos continuar perseverando en nuestra fe y por eso aquí en San Antonio seguimos escuchando confesiones, celebrando la Misa para escuchar la Palabra de Dios y alimentarnos de su cuerpo y de su sangre en la Eucaristía que nos mantiene fuertes y unidos como una verdadera Iglesia de Dios. Les doy las gracias por su Fe, fidelidad, perseverancia y testimonio en Dios.

Después de la muerte y resurrección de nuestro Señor, los discípulos, aun con dudas, miedos y reservaciones poco a poco volvieron a su vida normal, algunos aun con los ojos puestos en la muerte y no la resurrección. Como dice Lucas, “¿Por qué buscáis entre los muertos al que vive? No está aquí, ha resucitado.” Los invito a deshacernos de nuestros miedos, y fijar nuestra confianza y mantener la esperanza en Jesucristo nuestro Señor. Nuestra jornada con esta pandemia aún no termina, debemos seguir siendo cuidadosos y precavidos, pero como creyentes de la resurrección e hijos de Dios por nuestro bautismo, no podemos pararnos, si no avanzar, no con más miedos si no con toda la confianza en el Espíritu de Dios, Espíritu de vida y de verdad.

Después de resucitar de entre los muertos, Jesús se

acercó a sus discípulos y los incrédulos y les dijo “La paz este con ustedes.” En esos cuarenta días, Jesucristo comió con ellos, caminó con ellos y habló con ellos. Dejó que lo tocaran. Luego fue llevado a las nubes para sentarse a la derecha de Dios. Pero antes de su partida, prometió no dejarnos nunca y hoy celebramos esa venida del Espíritu Santo que vino sobre los apóstoles y viene sobre nosotros. Un espíritu de amor que llena nuestros corazones. El Espíritu Santo que nos permite permanecer en él como él permanece en nosotros. Con la gracia de ese Espíritu, los invito, sigamos en la jornada de vida y fe en el Señor.

Vivimos y trabajamos en un mundo cada vez más materialista, en una sociedad que casi no cree en Dios. Pero los que creemos en Dios, nosotros los Cristianos tenemos la misión de llevar la Buena Nueva a nuestros hermanos y hermanas. Amando a través de nuestros hechos y acciones. Recordemos que somos Cristianos en cada momento de nuestras vidas no solo los Domingos o cuando estamos dentro del templo. Nuestro cuerpo físico es el templo de Dios donde vive el Espíritu Santo. Seamos las mejores versiones de nosotros mismos todo el tiempo. Intentémoslo, no es fácil y caeremos. Pero levántate, recibe el Sacramento de la Reconciliación, confiesa los pecados que Dios ya sabe que has cometido. Dios te conoce. Él te creó. La Solemnidad de la Santísima Trinidad

UN MISTERIO ASOMBROSO

Asombroso es una palabra que usó Clemente de Alejandría para referirse a la Santísima Trinidad. Las Escrituras de hoy narran historias asombrosas, desde Moisés en el Antiguo Testamento hasta el final del Evangelio de Mateo, de cómo nosotros meros humanos, estamos destinados a estar íntimamente asociados con nuestro amoroso Dios. Vemos en el libro del Deuteronomio que Moisés recuerda a la nueva generación de israelitas el hecho “asombroso” de que, aunque el mundo antiguo rebosaba con dioses, su Dios era el único Dios, que “no hay otro”. San Pablo en su carta a los Romanos escribe acerca de quienes siguen al Espíritu Santo como “hijos” de Dios, lo que por supuesto, nos convertiría en hermanos y hermanas de Cristo y, como dice, “coherederos con Cristo”. ¡Otra afirmación sorprendente! Por último, Cristo otorga el Espíritu Santo al mundo como su presencia continua y fuerza de revelación divina. ¿Cómo no asombrarse?

EL MISTERIO ES LA OBRA MAESTRA

La Santísima Trinidad es la verdad central y, de hecho, el misterio de nuestras vidas como creyentes en Dios. Aun así, pocos parecen ser capaces de hablar de ella. (¿O es “ellos”?) ¿Debemos conformarnos con tomar esta verdad como un objeto de fe que podemos ignorar fácilmente? ¡De ninguna manera! Estamos inmersos en la realidad trinitaria de muchas maneras.

Por favor considera estos indicios de que Dios es más que una persona del Padre. Recuerda las palabras de Dios en las Escrituras cuando el mundo y todas sus maravillas fueron creados. La frase con la que empieza cada etapa de la creación dice: “Hagamos. . .” (Génesis 1:26). Esto no es simplemente el “Nosotros, la realeza”. Este es Dios como una pluralidad de Seres. En Isaías, los serafines claman: “Santo, santo, santo. . .” (Isaías 6:3). Este uso múltiple de una palabra (superlativo) en la región del mundo del Antiguo Oriente era usado tres veces, pero ¿por qué no considerarlo como un signo de la triplicidad de Dios? Y estas prefiguraciones del Antiguo Testamento no son nada comparadas con nuestra conocida fórmula bautismal: “Yo te bautizo en el nombre del Padre y, del Hijo y del Espíritu Santo”. Hay que notar que “nombre” es singular, y sin embargo se refiere a tres personas. Por último, como Cristo les dice a los apóstoles en el Evangelio de hoy, deben salir y enseñar en ese mismo triple nombre singular.

¿BAILAMOS?

El famoso icono del igualmente famoso iconógrafo del siglo XIV, Adrej Rublev, es una representación de la Trinidad densamente cargada de contenido simbólico. Los tres “ángeles” sentados en la mesa son en realidad el Padre, el Hijo y el Espíritu Santo. Se relacionan entre sí con gestos amorosos, cada uno con el otro, a menudo descritos como “danzantes”. Y, sin embargo, este círculo triangular parece incompleto. De hecho, lo está. Como en una danza, somos llevados a la vida divina en el brazo trinitario de abundante gloria y armonía. Luego completamos el movimiento llevando ese amor encarnado al mundo, revelando el misterio a nuestras hermanas y hermanos a través de nuestras vidas.

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
